
Wishing you a Happy New Year 2024

Partnership with Capilano University



Cap U/Howe Sound Biosphere Working Group team meets quarterly to review opportunities and plans.

We are thrilled with Capilano University's purchase of Quest University in Squamish and the opening of the academic year. Our partnership with Cap U aims to connect more youth to nature and bring capacity to our partners in the region. For the past three years, we have initiated and supported projects for faculty and students in the Howe Sound Biosphere.

Most recently, School of Tourism Management students delivered their project 'Sustainability Toolkit Promotion Strategy'. Four case studies were developed on tourism operators who are striving to meet the <u>GreenStep Sustainable Tourism</u> certification.

As costs of field trips can be expensive, we also encourage donations to the <u>Capilano University Foundation's Howe Sound Biosphere Fund</u> to help support more students, such as Tom Flower's biology students placing wildlife cameras in support of our projects.

Mica's first year in the role, with funding from Enviornment and Climate Change Canada, has been to advance our work strengthening conservation management. With many projects underway, we have been working alongside BC Nature in the pursuit of identifying potential OECMs (Other Effective Area-Based Conservation Measures) for inclusion in the Canadian Protected and Conserved Area database. The targets are on municipal and private lands.

Mica and resarch assistant Joey are also producing a Howe Sound Terrestrial Atlas accompanied by story maps. In addition to this work, we are working with community partners on wildlife connectivity, rockfish monitoring and species at risk.

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At the end of February, we will host our BC UNESCO colleagues from the Clayoquot Sound Biosphere Trust and Mt. Arrowsmith Biosphere Region for knowledge sharing. We will gather over three days at the Cheakamus Centre in Paradise Valley.

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Protecting our Marine Life

Thank you to the RBC Foundation for their contribution of a community grant toward the <u>European Green Crab monitoring</u>. With the support of the Sea to Sky Invasive Species Council, the program was expanded beyond upper Howe Sound to include Bowen Island and West Howe Sound this coming season. So far no EGC have been found.
