Community Sustainability Leadership



While climate resiliency is top of mind for all communities given the dramatic weather events we are experiencing, the Town of Gibsons is taking the lead on taking care of its natural assets. In November, Mayor Bill Beamish hosted a Watershed Dialogue, inviting agencies and stakeholders together virtually about the importance of protecting the Gibson's aquifer: Gibsons is the first community in Canada to create a position of Natural Assets Technician. Vulnerable Species Spotlight

Activities in the high elevation areas of our region pose threats to these wild creatures. From the BC Government website: Tracking populations of mountain goats in remote mountainous terrain is challenging at best. Current estimates indicate that while some populations appear to be stable others are in decline and are therefore particularly vulnerable. For this reason, mountain goats were categorized as Blue by the B.C. Conservation Data Centre in 2015. Mitigating threats to mountain goats is important to help maintain and/or recover their populations.

Biologists have noted that activities, such as timber harvesting and road building, impact mountain goat habitat. Mountain goats are also sensitive to disturbance from both ground-based forestry/industry and helicopter activities. The increasing popularity of helicopter-based recreation is having a detrimental effect on mountain goats as it is causing human disturbance in areas that are intended to offer refuge and security for goats.
