Mill history

Port Mellon is the oldest operating Pulp & Paper mill in British Columbia





Facility & production capacity

- Kraft Digester, Bleach Plant and Utility Island
- Annual pulp production: 455,000 ADMT/yr
- Deep sea port facility for economic access to Pacific Rim economies
- Self-generated green power export to BC's grid
- Coastal BC fibre supply dominated by sawmill residual chips and pulp logs











Economic Contribution


- 360 full time employees
- 1,500 indirect jobs in British Columbia
- \$350 million in direct economic contribution
- Local property taxation of \$1.5 million annually





Caring for the Environment

- ISO 14001 Environmental Management System Certified
- 91% of HSPP energy comes from renewal sources
- 49% reduction in greenhouse gases since 1990
- 86% of HSPP power use is self generated green electricity
- 100% of HSPP's wood fibre is low risk using the FSC risk assessment process
- Certified to FSC Controlled Wood
- Strictest emission standards on the BC coast





Social Endeavours

- Robust health and safety program to help protect employees
- Local sponsorship and donation program that supports important aspects of the Sunshine Coast community
- Mill scholarship program for postgraduate students
- Howe Sound employee's endowment fund for charitable organizations focused on health and wellness











Indigenous Relations

We are at a foundational stage of becoming better neighbours and partners with Indigenous communities. Some highlights of 2021 include:

- Commitment to Indigenous Peoples through reconcili-action
 - Renaming of Powell River mill to Tla'amin name tiskwat
 - Donation to AIRS memorial fund
 - Cultural awareness training led by First Nations
- 2021 focus on the ground to building education and training opportunities:
 - First Nation donations in BC = \$150,000
 - First Nation scholarships = \$34,000
 - INDSpire scholarships = \$100,000
 - Apprenticeship and training dollars
 earmarked = \$50,000
 - First pilot year for Metis Scholarship
